MAJORS

The major stockshows are in full swing now and several Kinney County 4-hers made trips to both San Angelo and San Antonio this month. These livestock shows have exhibitors from across the state and are extremely competitive. Our Kinney County kids represented our local area very well and exhibited their projects to their full potential.

In San Angelo, Angelina and Samuel Waddell showed in the Commercial Doe Show. Justus York, Brayden Ford, Madeleine Ducharme, and Will Lewis exhibited steers. Jack Lewis came home with a second place ribbon in the heifer show.

Lensda Perez and and Julius Flores started the San Antonio Livestock Show off with their commercial does. Next was the Junior Market Goat Show, which had Abby Coffman, Caraline Ducharme, and Madeleine Ducharme participating. Caraline was just a few places out of making the sale. Jack Lewis was in a tough Limousin heifer class and wound up 4th. Will Lewis, Caydie Castro and Madeleine Ducharme were in classes that had 30 plus steers in them. Madeleine missed the sale by one slot. Andrew Davis was the lone swine entry and did a great job in his first big show.

Kinney County had 4 contestants in the Calf Scramble. Caydie Castro, Abigail Coffman, Angelina Waddell, and Samuel Waddell. These kids gave it their all, but Samuel was the only one to catch.

Samuel came in third in the first rodeo performance which qualified him for the finals this past Friday. He had one caught in the finals but had a little trouble with the halter and it got away. Abigail Coffman, Amelia Pimental, Will Lewis, Jack Lewis, Caraline Ducharme, Madeleine Ducharme, and Caydie Castro all were a part of the San Antonio School Tour program which had them leading elementary age school kids through the educational areas at the rodeo.

These kids have worked very hard with their projects and have shown their leadership skills by actively participating at these shows. Kinney County is very blessed to have kids such as these representing our county! Great job!

San Antonio Rodeo Calf Scramble



Kinney County 4-Hers Caydie Castro, Abigail Coffman, Angelina Waddell, and Samuel Waddell were among the contestants from across the state that competed in this year's 85th San Antonio Rodeo Calf Scramble. In this event, 4-H & FFA Members race against other contestants to catch a calf, halter it and lead it across the finish line. This is all done on the floor of the AT&T Center during rodeo performances. Winners receive a purchase certificate to go towards purchasing a breeding animal to show at next year's stock show. Each year, the calf scramble committee awards over \$185,000 to 4-H & FFA members from across the state.

Unfortunately, Samuel was the only lucky one that brought home one of these certificates. Samuel came in third in his rodeo performance, which qualified him to compete in the February 23rd finals. Samuel was one of the first to catch in the finals but had a little problem with the halter and couldn't get his calf across the finish line.

Anyone interested in competing in the District 10 4-H Horse Show in June or the State 4-H Horse Show in July must validate all of their horses by May 1, 2024. Validation is a process where the horses registration papers and pictures are uploaded on 4-Honline. If you are interested in competing in these events, please contact our office, 830-563-2442, and we can help.

Here are a few reminders about the horse validation

- ·ALL horses must be validated/re-validated each year. There is no limit to the number of horses that can be validated. You are encouraged to validate all horses that may possibly be shown at district and/or state shows. Only state validated horses can be substituted in the event that a validated horse becomes unusable due to lameness, sickness, etc.
- ·The family can submit payment of \$10.00 per horse (\$20.00 after April 15th, or \$250 from May 1st to May 5th), in the form of a credit card ONLY.
- ·From March 1 April 15, the validation cost for each horse is \$10.00. The \$10.00 cost is only guaranteed if the animal validation is approved by the county office by the April 15th deadline and the payment is processed.

From April 16 – May 1, the validation cost for each horse is \$20.00. The \$20.00 cost is only guaranteed if the animal validation is approved by the county office by the May 1st deadline and the navment is processed
